

#### **Phenomenal Phives News**

**In Language Arts,** we have been continuing to focus on sentence writing

and character traits. We are building towards our summative assignment using

the mentor text *The Best Part of Me*, and are continuing to analyze our novel

One Amazing Elephant.

**In Math 5 A, B, C and E** will be working on Multiplication where they will need to recall facts to 81, multiply by powers of 10 and multiply 2 X 2 digit numbers.

**Math 5D** we are continuing with place value; learning how to estimate and round whole numbers.

**In Science 5A, B, and C** are just finishing up their Classroom Chemistry Unit. The students will then begin their Electricity Unit.

**Science 5D and E** we have been learning about the water cycle. We have been learning all about the different aspects of the water cycle and students were excited to "Make it Rain" in the classroom!

**Social Studies A, B, D, E** we continue to work on mapping skills such as types and parts of maps, latitude and longitude and scale. A summative 'Amusement Park' project and unit test will be upcoming towards the end of the month.

**Social 5C** - We are just starting chapter 2; the Atlantic Region.

#### Please remember to sign your child's agenda daily.

In November Grade 5 Girls' Club will begin. Every Monday, from 11:20 - 11:50, grade 5 girls can meet in Ms. Macklin's room (105), for various independent or group activities.

#### A couple of reminders to parents:

## Grade 6 Pod

#### LA

6A—In Language Arts we are beginning to analyze the Circle Story format! By reading mentor texts, we have begun to identify characteristics of this story format, and are working towards writing our own Circle Stories.

6B/C - The reading and writing workshops are up and running and the students in these classes are becoming independent and fluent in the workshop model. In reading, we are working through different foundational reading strategies, such as: self monitoring, making connections, predicting, sequencing and inferring. In writing, the students are working hard on revising and re-angling their chosen personal narrative by experimenting with their story's beginning and ending, adding thoughtful dialogue, slowing down and stretching out their story's problem, and finally, editing sentences for rhythm and meaning.

6D - After learning about the effectiveness of Notice and Note Signposts as both comprehension aides and creativity boosters in our own writing, we have moved on to creating Circle Stories and Text Mapping.

#### Social

In Social, we have studied the basics of democracy and learned how we can put democracy to action in our own lives. We have studied our different rights and freedoms and discussed the most effective ways to come to a decision. In November, we will be taking an indepth look at the levels of government, specifically focusing on and beginning with the municipal government.

#### Science

We are coming to the end of our Trees and Forests unit. Students have been working hard on their final projects and will write their unit test in the beginning of November.

#### Math

Students have now completed their unit on Numeration, and we are starting our Number Relationships unit. Students will learn about factors, multiples, prime and composite numbers, and prime factorization. Students will also get their first exposure to integers and order of operations on whole numbers.

### Grade 7 Pod

We are continuing to write our personal narratives in Writers Workshop. It is a long process but we should be done in a couple of weeks.

We have started a Global Read Aloud with the novel A Long Walk to Water. It will take us until Christmas break. We are doing a lot of digital assignments with this unit. If your child has and is allowed to bring a digital mobile device, we will be using them in class. This is not mandatory it is just for convenience and having access to devices when needed. I have school devices booked for these assignments, so bringing their own device is NOT mandatory.

#### Math

We are finishing the "Fractions, Decimals, and Percents" Unit and will be moving onto "Fraction Operations". The first progress report will come out upon completion of the Fraction, Decimal, and Percent unit test.

#### Science

In Science 7 students are going to be completing our first unit this month - Interactions and Ecosystems. We have been learning about the environmental impacts of our daily actions, and how food chains and food webs are affected. Our next unit will be Plants for Food & Fibre, and we're really looking forward to sharing how important plants are in our daily lives!

#### Social

In the month of November, we will be moving on from exciting European Explorers unit and into Early European Colonies. This unit will comprise of 1 major assignment and 1 unit test at the end of November.

#### Science

In Science 7 students are going to be completing our first unit this month - Interactions and Ecosystems. We have been learning about the environmental impacts of our daily actions, and how food chains and food webs are affected. Our next unit will be Plants for Food & Fibre, and we're really looking forward to sharing how important plants are in our daily lives!



### **Grade 8 POD News**

Can it really be November already? We had some visitors from Columbia in our grade 8 classes this past month and we were sad to see them leave. It was wonderful how much our students embraced their new international friends.

**Math:** At the beginning of November, we will complete Chapter 2: Ratios, Rates & Percent. The third chapter will be Integer Operations. We will review the addition and subtraction of integers. Then, we will learn to both multiply and divide integers. Next, we will look to solve multiple operation problems that include all four operations. Lastly, we will solve problems involving integers. Therefore, the month of November will primarily focus on Chapter 3!

**Science**: We have been working on finishing up our first until of Mix and Flow of Matter. We have investigated the properties of concentration, density, buoyancy and viscosity over the past month. A highlight being our density tower activity. Students will have their first unit exam early in November.

Language Arts: We have completed our quiz on the elements of a short story and our essay outline for <a href="https://example.com/The-Princess Bride">The Princess Bride</a>. Students continue to work on writing and short story analysis. Students will learn different reading strategies and will apply the numerous elements of the short story we have focused on in class to the stories we are studying. Encouraging your child to read at home for 20 minutes/night can enhance their literacy and develop a love for reading. If you have struggling readers, take some time to read with them, have them read aloud to you, ask them questions about what they are reading, or even enjoy a good book together. Reading is worth the investment.

**Social Studies:** Social Studies is cruising right along through the Renaissance unit and we are about to begin our journey into humanism. In this unit, we study Renaissance Art as well changes in society that were put in place to make their lives easier. There is a massive introduction of technology during this time period and the kids tend to get excited. Stay tuned for more.

# **Counsellor Corner**

#### Online dangers and how to keep kids safe online

Kid's safety online:

The Internet is a great social networking tool for young people, but abusers know it and use its anonymity to access kids. Predators can adopt a false identity, initiate trusting friendships with children or youth and attempt to meet them in person.

Online child sexual exploitation is a serious problem. Approximately one in five children is sexually solicited online.1

"Luring" is a term describing a number of dangerous activities an adult may engage in with a child online. It can include convincing a child or youth to reveal personal details about themselves and family members, sending photos, or meeting in person. Sending photos to even a relative over the Internet can be risky because an exploiter can intercept the photos and cut and paste the child's image into a pornographic photo and then distribute it.

#### Warning signs your child may be unsafe online;

Your child spends large amounts of time online, especially at night, and doesn't want to tell you who s/he is talking to or what s/he is doing.

You find pornography on your child's computer.

Your child receives phone calls from adults you don't know or is making calls, sometimes long distance, to numbers you don't recognize.

Your child asks for a web camera or moves the web camera to a more private location.

Your child receives mail, gifts, or packages from someone you don't know.

Your child turns the computer monitor off or quickly changes the screen when you come into the room.

Your child becomes withdrawn from the family.

Your child is using an online account belonging to someone else.

#### How parents can keep kids safe online:

The most important thing you can do to keep kids safe online is talk with your kids—before someone else does. By setting guidelines, explaining the dangers and supervising younger children online, caregivers can dramatically reduce the chances their child will meet an online acquaintance in real life.

#### 10 cyber-safety tips for parents and caregivers

Here are 10 cyber-safety tips you can use to prepare your kids for the online world:

Talk to your kids about online safety issues.

Build guidelines and a family agreement around Internet use just as you would for other activities.

Be proactive in finding out who your kids are talking to online by spending time with them on the Internet.

Keep your computer in a public area of your house.

Never disclose personal details online.

They should never post pictures of themselves online to people they do not know. Webcams and camera phones make it easy to take and transmit images—and too often, young people are lured into sending explicit pictures that are then used to manipulate them. Explain to your child that everything sent out over the Internet could last there forever.

Reinforce that people online may not be who they say they are.

Consider using parental controls like Internet filters or blocking software.

Encourage open dialogue with your kids and offer a "No-Questions-Asked Bailout" as a safety net if they feel they could be in danger.

Be constructive about good places for them to visit on the Internet.

#### Safety tips for social networking sites

Social networking sites are very popular with young people. Most have privacy controls that limit access. Ensure that your child or youth's site has the privacy controls set so that only those known to them can access their information. Explain that they should never accept an invitation from someone they don't know—even if that person claims to be a friend of a friend.

#### What to do if you suspect sexual exploitation online:

Any instance of suspected child exploitation on the Internet, including pornography or sexually explicit communication with a child or youth, should be reported to www.cybertip.ca. Cybertip.ca analysts are available 24 hours a day, seven days per week to accept calls from those who require direct assistance. If you are worried about any child being hurt, report what you do know and let the experts handle the rest. You might save a child or youth from unimaginable hurt.

What to do if you suspect sexual exploitation online:

Any instance of suspected child exploitation on the Internet, including pornography or sexually explicit communication with a child or youth, should be reported to www.cybertip.ca. Cybertip.ca analysts are available 24 hours a day, seven days per week to accept calls from those who require direct assistance. If you are worried about any child being hurt, report what you do know and let the experts handle the rest. You might save a child or youth from unimaginable hurt.

Talk immediately, calmly and frankly to your child in a supportive, calming way

Contact your local police

Report these incidents to your Internet Service Provider (ISP).

Remember, Internet controls—though good—cannot take the place of honest, open dialogue. Young people may access the Internet from a friend's house, school, library or on mobile devices.
