


R.I.Baker's 1st Annual Art Gala

GRADE 5 POD NEWS

There are a number of students who need to replenish their pencil supply for the remainder of the year. Please check with your child to see if they are one of these students.

We hope that you all have a very Hoppy Easter.

Language Arts: We are currently diving into nonfiction texts, learning to identify and understand the function of various text features to gain a greater comprehension from the text. The mentor texts we are currently using are from the *Who Would Win?* series by Jerry Pallotta.

Math: 5 - We are finishing up Patterns and Relationships and then will move on to Data and Relationships where students will collect data and create graphs.

Science: 5 - We have started our unit on Weather and will continue to explore how weather is created, measured and affects our lives this month.

Social 5: April will have us moving west to the Cordillera region and then finally to our own region, the Interior Plains, on our exploration of the geographical regions of Canada.

GRADE 6 POD NEWS

Language Arts: This month, we will continue to focus on our writing, with both short stories and then start on news articles. We will continue to work on effective conventional skills, such as punctuation, capitalization, and sentence structure, as well as incorporating creative choices into our writing. It's going to be a writing-focused month! We will also continue with our class read aloud, *Refugee*.



Math: Continuing with Unit #5: Angles and Polygons, from March we learned about what traits polygons have such as angles, sides, and vertices, and how to determine the measurement of angles using a protractor. This unit also reviewed some concepts learned in grade 5 dealing with perimeter, area, and volume. We will continue using these concepts as we move into Unit #6: Geometry, which will focus on different types of triangles as well as determining unknown angles by knowing that the sum of all angles for triangles and quadrilaterals are 180 and 360 degrees respectively.

Science: We started our Flight Unit in March with a focus on parts of an aircraft and the movements they're responsible for. As we move into April we will begin to look more closely at other types of gliders and floaters, and will also have a parachute design contest where students can once again apply their knowledge of flight to try to build the most effective parachute design to complete a series of tasks.

Social: In Social, we have begun our unit about Ancient Athens. We have been looking at the birthplace of democracy, discussing how much democracy has changed -- or not changed -- in the last 2500 years. Following Greece, we will be studying consensus and the Iroquois Confederacy.



GRADE 7 POD NEWS

Language Arts: We are currently working our way through our fourth unit: Poetry. Students will be exploring the different forms of poetry, what makes up a poem and discovering where poetry started and how it has developed over time. Students will finish this unit off with their own unique creation of slam poetry.

Math: We are currently working on our Patterns and Relations unit. In this unit students create expressions (numbers and letters) from written problems. In our next unit, Variables and Equations, students will be learning to solve the expressions that they have created.

Science: We are currently working our way through our fourth unit: Heat and Temperature. We started it right at the end of March. Students are learning about heat as well as investigating sources and uses of heat energy. Students will also explore the particle model of matter and use it to help explain their observations and understandings about the relationship between heat and temperature.

Social: We are continuing to learn about Confederation with Chapters 8 and 9. We will be focusing on important moments and people that created the country of Canada, and focusing on how they have shaped us, and still affect us today. Materials will be posted on Google Classroom as we reach them.

GRADE 8 POD NEWS

Language Arts: Students are working to complete their essays in our "Take a Stand: Critical Writing" unit. They have learned the format of essays, how to find good sources, and how to include solid evidence to back up their arguments. We are currently working on bringing everything together and producing a professional final essay. Following this unit, we will be beginning our giant Project-Based Learning Humanities unit.

Math: In April, we will be well on our way in Chapter 6: Surface Area & Volume. In Grade 8, there is a focus on 3D objects. These 3D objects include: rectangular prisms, triangular prisms & cylinders. We begin by understanding the nets of these 3D objects. Next, students will learn to develop and apply formulas for determining the surface area and volume of these 3D objects. Finally, students will solve problems regarding surface area and volume of 3D objects. As this is a rather extensive chapter, it will take us into May to finish.

Science: In April students will continue with their Mechanical Systems unit. Machines are used for many purposes in our daily lives when we need to transfer energy into motion or move materials in a controlled way. In learning about mechanical devices, students investigate how components are linked so that energy is transferred efficiently and desired functions are performed. A comparison of past and present technologies helps students recognize that different approaches have been used over time to meet common needs. Evaluations of efficiency, effectiveness and impacts on daily life, the community and the environment are important considerations in this unit.

Social: By April we will be wrapping up our second major unit, the Aztecs. The students loved this unit and were actively engaged in discussion and debate in terms of the concepts we learned. Students were given the opportunity to choose projects they were interested in to showcase their knowledge and understanding of the Aztec curriculum. Mid way through April we will begin our third and final unit, Japan.


Track and Field

Palliser Town Bus passes available July 4, 2023

Almost all students residing in Coaldale are deemed ineligible for transportation by Alberta

Learning (i.e. they live within a 2.4 km radius from their designated school), and there is no provincial funding available.

As a result, the bussing must be provided on a "fee for service" basis. The cost to parents has been set at \$260.00 for the 2023-2024 school year. Students that live 2.4 km or more from the school they are attending and have been regular bus students in the past, do not need to call or purchase passes.

To determine if your child is eligible for funded busing, parents are to contact Palliser at (403)-380-2612. If your child is not eligible for funded transportation contact the Town of Coaldale at (403) 345-1300 to register for the In-Town Busing Service. An application form must be filled out with information for each student with the \$260.00 payment before a bus pass will be issued. Once payment has been made, your child's information will be forwarded to Palliser School Division and you will be contacted by Palliser with bus route information.

The In-Town Busing service is limited to 130 students, and service will be granted on a first come first served basis. Registrations will open on July 4, 2023 and be taken until all of the passes are sold for the 2023-24 school year.






